Request:

[REDACTED] requested technical assistance in researching communication resources. He noted that their organization is working on expanding their emergency plan to meet the new Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) Emergency Preparedness (EP) Rule requirements, and one area that they were reviewing was communication. He also asked if it was recommended that organizations identify backup communication systems (e.g., walkie talkies) and have redundancy in case telephone and cell phone lines are not working.

[REDACTED] also asked “what is the rule when it comes to HIPAA (Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act) protection during a disaster?” For example, how does this apply when staff are checking on a home patient in a flood area and they need to ask neighbors questions such as, “have they seen the patient?”

Response:

The ASPR TRACIE Team researched several emergency planning resources related to communications, as well as homecare/ hospice-specific planning resources. In addition, the ASPR TRACIE Team researched materials related to HIPAA. These resources are provided in the sections below and are categorized as follows:

CMS is currently developing the interpretive guidelines and the State Operations Manual that will address specific regulatory expectations. This is expected to be completed by Spring 2017.
