Request:

[REDACTED] requested technical assistance in searching for emergency preparedness plans, templates, examples, and guidance for an outpatient rehabilitation agency for older adults. She noted she is requesting this information because her organization is one of the 17 provider types identified under the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) Emergency Preparedness (EP) Rule.

Response:

The ASPR TRACIE Team conducted a search for emergency preparedness resources related to outpatient rehabilitation agencies for older adults. Unfortunately we could not identify any emergency plans or other materials specific to outpatient rehabilitation agencies. However, we provide several helpful resources in the following sections of this document.

- **Section I** – Includes emergency operations/ management plans, tools, and templates that can be adopted for various healthcare facilities, including Comprehensive Outpatient Rehabilitation Facilities (CORFs).
- **Section II** – Provides general evacuation/ shelter in place plans, tools, and templates that can be modified for various healthcare facility types.
- **Section III** – Includes a hazard vulnerability assessment tool, which can be used by healthcare facilities.
- **Section IV** – Provides general emergency preparedness resources for older adults.
- **Section V** – Provides general emergency preparedness resources.
- **Section VI** – Includes links to websites that contain information specific to the CMS EP Rule requirements for CORFs.

CMS-specific Information:

CMS is currently developing the interpretive guidelines and the State Operations Manual that will address specific regulatory expectations. This is expected to be completed by late Spring 2017. ASPR TRACIE has developed and collected a number of resources that we encourage you to use and believe will help facilitate compliance, including the resources provided here. However, this does not substitute review of the final rule text and interpretive guidelines. I. Emergency Operations/ Management Plans, Tools, and Templates

Kansas Department of Health and Environment. (2013). [Emergency Management Plan for Kansas Chronic Dialysis Facilities](#).

This is an emergency management plan template for chronic dialysis facilities in Kansas that may be adapted for other facilities.

Kidney Community Emergency Response Coalition. (2007). [Dialysis Facility Disaster Plan Template](#).

This facility-specific emergency operations planning template can be customized by dialysis facility or other healthcare facility staff.

II. Evacuation/ Shelter in Place Plans, Tools, and Templates

This plan is designed to assist in activating sheltering, patient relocation, or partial or full evacuation of a healthcare facility. It provides action steps, and includes a decision tree to help guide facilities on whether to shelter, evacuate, or relocate. It also includes various templates and checklists (e.g., incident management staff checklists).

Los Angeles County Emergency Medical Services Agency. (2012). [Evacuation and Shelter-in-Place Guidelines for Healthcare Entities.](#)

This guidance document is comprised of three parts. Part I provides general guidance on the differences between evacuation and shelter in place, including the roles and responsibilities of healthcare facilities and the healthcare system. Part II includes an evacuation and shelter in place plan template that healthcare facilities can use to create or update their own plan. Part III includes a set of two tabletop exercises (shelter-in-place and evacuation) that facility emergency planners may use in the planning phase as they develop their plans to identify needs, gaps, or solutions, and/or may use to educate personnel on the components of their existing plan.

This emergency sheltering and evacuation template can be tailored by facility emergency planners. It includes 10 appendices on topics such as relocation, hospital incident command, and supplies.
