Judith Cohen, MD

Professor of Psychiatry, Drexel University, Allegheny General Hospital (PA)

Dr. Cohen is a Board Certified Child & Adolescent Psychiatrist, Medical Director of the Allegheny General Hospital Center for Traumatic Stress in Children & Adolescents, and Professor of Psychiatry at Drexel University College of Medicine in Pittsburgh, PA. With Tony Mannarino, Ph.D. and Esther Deblinger, Ph.D., Dr. Cohen developed and tested Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT), an evidence-based treatment for traumatized children, and has received more than two dozen grants related to the assessment and treatment of child maltreatment and trauma. Dr. Cohen is Co-Chair of the American Academy of Child & Adolescent Psychiatry's Child Maltreatment and Violence Committee, first author of its PTSD practice parameters, and a recipient of its Rieger Award for Scientific Achievement. She has served on the Boards of Directors of the International Society for Traumatic Stress Studies and the American Professional Society on the Abuse of Children. She maintains an active practice focused on disseminating evidence-based treatment for traumatized children and adolescents.
