What Happened?

A bus driver and 30 Chinese nationals were headed to Bryce Canyon National Park late Friday morning when the bus rolled off the road on State Route 12, MP10 and crashed into a guardrail, according to the Garfield County Sheriff's Office.







What Happened Next?

Susan Harris, Garfield Memorial Hospital ED manager, heard the page to EMS and began to notify the caregivers at GMH that a tour bus had crashed, and patients were on the way. Hospital caregivers began preparations to receive a surge of trauma patients from the crash.




The Injured: 19 Patients

- EMS triaged and transported to GMH:
 - 3 Red, 11 yellow, and 5 green
- Upon arrival to GMH a secondary triage was conducted, 3 patients were upgraded to red for a <u>revised triage</u> of 6 Red, 8 yellow, and 5 green
 - Admitted 1 for overnight observation
 - Discharged 7
 - Transferred 11 patients to SGRH Level 2
