Just Released: CMS Emergency Preparedness Rule

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) <u>announced</u> the release of the <u>Emergency Preparedness Requirements for Medicare and Medicaid</u> <u>Participating Providers and Suppliers</u>. This important <u>new rule</u> establishes national emergency preparedness requirements for <u>17 provider and supplier</u> types to ensure adequate planning for natural and human-caused disasters, and coordination with federal, state, tribal, regional, and local emergency preparedness systems. <u>ASPR TRACIE has a dedicated page</u> with links to resources that can help you start or update your planning process. We will work closely with CMS to gather and share relevant resources and help with assistance requests. New ASPR TRACIE Resources

Healthcare providers and staff who maintain facility operations are not immune to the negative effects of a disaster, yet they are critical to the response phase and expected to care for their own loved ones, community members, and the facility. Tips for Retaining and Caring for Staff after a Disaster provides general promising practices—categorized by immediate and short-term needs—for facility executives to consider when trying to retain and care for staff after a disaster.

Noble Lifesaver Patient Movement Workshop: Promising Practices and Lessons Learned highlights findings from a series of workshops designed to test and examine the scope of federal assistance for patient movement (PM) functions and the specific requirements among local, state, regional, and federal emergency support function (ESF) #8 partners to execute PM. The document also highlights lessons learned and promising practices shared by workshop participants and provides contact information if you are interested in participating in or hosting a Workshop.

Knowing what information can be released, to whom, and under what circumstances, is critical for healthcare facilities in disaster response. <u>HIPAA and Disasters: What Emergency Professionals Need to Know</u> answers frequently asked questions regarding the release of information about patients following an incident.

Zika Resources

On September 2, 2016 ASPR TRACIE released an updated version of <u>Zika</u>: <u>Resources at Your Fingertips</u> to reflect revised resources and new information. This version includes the following HHS-developed planning resources: <u>Supporting Children with Special Healthcare Needs</u>, <u>Maternal-Fetal Health</u>, <u>Zika</u> <u>Virus Planning Considerations for Healthcare Facilities and Coalitions</u>, and <u>Guillain-Barré Syndrome and Other Neurological Deficits</u>.
